



QCF Student meets LaGuardia Students (LIB 200)



He is attending the Restoration Plaza Writing Group in Bedford Stuyvesant, Brooklyn on Tuesday evenings. He practices meditation and hopes to teach others how to find peace and self-focus as he returns to society.



I am writing this this letter to you my little queen. First of all, I want you to know that I am very sorry for putting you through what I have been putting you through. Because I did not know that we both would be doing time, baby girl. But I want you to know that Daddy loves you so very much. I am sorry for the hurt and pain that I brought to your life. 

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
For nearly three years LaGuardia Community College and Queensboro Correctional Facility (QCF), located directly across the street from one another, have had a partnership. University professors, under the direction and development of Professor John R. Chaney – Program Director of LaGCC's Criminal Justice Program; volunteer to teach college classes.

This Queensboro Correctional Facility is a minimum security prison with the primary purpose of acting as a re-entry center for male inmates. The current capacity of Queensboro Correctional Facility is 416 inmates.

One class is Creative Writing which student prisoners self-select to attend twice a week for three hours. Students this Fall, 2019 read Stephen King's On Writing: A memoir of the Craft as well as excerpts from Plato's Republic and the poetry of Langston Hughes. Students wrote poetry, letters, short stories, essays, reflections, and prayers. Some students came with hundreds of pages of writing including screen plays and novels they wrote during their years in prison. All participants shared their writing with the group for feedback.

LaGuardia Community College Students in a LIB 200 wrote to this class and several of the QCF students exchanged letters. A sample is on display here. Also on display is just a sampling of hundreds and hundreds of pages of writing generated by prisoners, often in the class but also through their years of incarceration. In some instances, bios, photos and press releases are included.

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BIO

Sylvester Lawrence Jackson II "Sonny" – Released on November 29, 2019

A prolific poet and writer, Sonny battled with cancer while in prison but uses writing as a therapeutic tool. Upon release he attends the Restoration Writing Group in Bedford Stuyvesant designed for people returning from the prison experience.
